


'Posse' approach smooths ride toward college

The Andover A Better Chance "posse" swings into action every school day at Andover High before the First Block bell rings at 7:45AM.

After the scramble of tooearly alarms, elusive binders and books, and brisk walks in unpredictable New England weather to the bus stop, these Andover ABC scholars usually gather at a table in the cafeteria. They grab a quick breakfast and, more importantly, touch base, share a laugh and reestablish the invisible threads of connectedness that bolster each young woman as she heads off, solo, to tackle the day.

women from ABC's oldest

community school program in the nation closely mimics other young groups of minority students that benefit from an organization in the news lately, the Posse Foundation.

The nonprofit Posse Foundation was created in 1988 by educator Deborah Bial. She recalled running into a student of hers who said he had dropped out of college but explained that he would have stayed if he had had his "posse" with him.

Out of this sprung an organization that has sent more than 4,000 inner-city youth to top-tier colleges and universities.

The model, similar to Andover ABC's, is based on the notion that bringing together a small group of talented students, carefully selected and given the right training and supports, powerfully leverages the positive forces of peer connection to ensure each individual's academic(continued inside)

What have the scholars of Andover A Better Chance been doing besides studies? You name it – sports, the arts, volunteering to local causes, intern work - and they probably have done it.

Freshman Fatouma Koné won a spot on the 9thgrade girls basketball team, playing at power forward. The team had a winning season and Fatouma finished strong. She is now co-captain of the 9th-grade girls lacrosse team.

They also participated in a number of workshops at Boston College's School of Education.

and social success while fostering greater understanding of diversity within the community. Biel has won a MacArthur Genius Award for her approach to increasing educational access.

With the Andover ABC model, a diverse group of students also is rigorously selected and placed together. They get extensive support from caring tutors, school counselors, host families, ABC staff, and board members to face the challenges of living away from home and attending an academically rigorous high school. It has been successfully harnessing the power of this strategy since the first class of young men entered the ABC house in 1967.

"At school we don't usually see each other," explains sophomore Abigail (Abbi) Awodele. "But at breakfast we all sit together at the table and laugh and bond together. We'll eat lunch with each other if we share a break, but usually only two of us are around."

"The high school would be a different place if I was not with these girls," states sophomore Deanna Starr.

The fortifying effects of the group play out in all areas of their lives; when it is time to hit the books, for instance. "We are all in the study room,' Deanna relates, "and I might say, 'Does this essay sound right?' I am definitely not a writer, so I say this a lot!"
