

Thriving in a home away from home

"The Dowe-Reillys are my best friends," states Justene Salomon, AHS class of 2010. "The ABC program truly gave me a better chance. It not only gave me a high school education so that I'd be in a better position to attend college, but it gave me a family."

She is referring to her Andover host family, which ABC arranges for each of its students. In her case, they were lan Dowe, an ABC board member at the time, his wife, Allison Reilly, and their three schoolaged children.

For Justene, it was a game changer. She graduated from Sacred Heart University with a BA in psychology and women's studies and now lives and works in New York City, where she is preparing for graduate school.

Host families are a cornerstone of the ABC program. Each new student is assigned to a host family in Andover at the beginning of her freshman year. Host families host their students for dinner every Wednesday and one weekend each month while school is in session. ABC students return to their actual families during school vacations.

The host family experience is designed to provide students with a support system rooted in the Andover community, an opportunity to expand their horizons beyond dorm life, and a place to enjoy downtime and a break from the stress of communal living. The host family commitment is a four-year one; often the bond goes on long after graduation.

Turalloy Jackson (AHS '09, Villanova '13) remembers fondly the experience of being a host daughter to Beth and Steve Jungmann. "They were very easy to talk to and I could speak to them about everything."

Jessica Spates (AHS '08, Wesleyan University '12) will never forget the first outing that she shared with her host family, Brenda and Dave Bryan. They were enjoying a Boston tradition – the Nutcracker ballet – when youngest daughter Flynn was violently ill during the "quietest time of the performance – you could hear a pin drop," Spates remembers.

It was while Alexis Singh, AHS '09, was teaching English in Madrid, Spain that she realized she loved working with teens.

Singh lived in Spain and taught teenagers for a year after graduating from Ithaca College in

2012 with a BS in public health and minor in counseling.

"I realized that I wanted to learn more about ways that I could improve health outcomes and I needed more skills and experiences to do that," she says. "It made sense that the next step would be a master's in public health."

Singh is currently pursuing her post-graduate degree at the University of Pennsylvania, focusing on sexual and reproductive health as well as maternal and child health.

Moving to Andover for high school from the Bronx (her family is originally from Guyana), has helped her enjoy living in diverse communities, she says. "ABC taught me how to live and work with people from different backgrounds... whether it be in Spain, Ithaca or Philly."

Singh sees the power of staying connected to her ABC roots. "I have come a long way since Andover High School, but I could not have done it without the opportunities I was given through the program.

"I have stayed in touch with a lot of the [ABC] girls, such as Lydia, Justene, Andrea, Camilla and Ashleigh, and I am very grateful that I created such amazing bonds in Andover. I look forward to seeing everyone at the 50th [anniversary], if not sooner!"

with Kai, the baby for a while.) Spates enjoyed all of it and remains very close to her host family.

Alexis Singh (AHS '09, Ithaca College '13) remembers many new experiences with her host family, including skiing and exploring Boston. "I also feel like they learned a lot about the Bronx and Guyana from me." She adds, "It was also amazing that, when I came over on the weekends or Wednesdays, they would always make vegetarian meals for me."

"My current host family is great," says A'mari Bing-Way (AHS '17). "They like to get out and do things; we've been to the beach, to Boston, to a fashion show."

Most students agree that one of the most important roles a host family plays in their lives is as a place to unwind. Bing-Way explains: "They have made it feel like a home rather than a place I just visit." She adds that time away from the dorm is very important. Spates agrees. "It was really important to have a place to go that was away from the program. It felt like a separation even though their house was still in the community."

The host daughter experience has impact well beyond the high school years. "I learned to be myself [with my host parents] and to be comfortable in my skin even as I was growing into my own. I learned how to expose my flaws and accept the consequences of that exposure because it made me learn more about myself," reflects Jackson.

Says Singh, "This past summer I attended the wedding of one of my host sisters and I had a great time reconnecting with them. I hope that I can go see them this summer if I am not too busy with my job and classes."

Salomon admits that, "after seven years it's no longer really 'hosting,'" but says that she makes several visits to Andover each year and always returns, for Christmas, to the Dowe-Reilly house. Or as she has come to think of it, home.

"Our involvement with ABC began in 1972," says Mitchell, a former president, "and soon led to fundraising for the program with Margot and George Bixby, Bill Washburn, Leonard Kent and others.

During those transformative years, the program acquired a second house for female-scholars who were added to the all-male program, then consolidated into a malefemale house and finally switched to all-girls.

"Our 13 years as host family to a series of five outstanding young scholars was an incredible time for the two of us and our kids, especially



for our daughter, who was quite competitive with her new friends," notes Mitchell, who served on the ABC board

for 26 years.

"We recommend the experience of hosting an ABC student to younger families in town. It is a unique chance to get to know and appreciate people from different walks of life."

The Mitchells look forward to the 50th anniversary in 2017 as a much-awaited opportunity to share memories with many of the young friends they made back in those days.
